How to complete homework in each subject: English: Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9

What is Sparx reader?

We are fortunate this year to be able to offer an exclusive new approach to our year 7 - 9 students, which will allow us to provide consistency and accountability in one of the most crucial aspects of their education - literacy. Each week, **they simply read a book online for one hour, and answer questions about what they have read.**

Why do we use this as homework?

There is an extensive body of research indicating that one of the most significant indicators in how successful a student will be, both academically and in later life, is their level of literacy, and that a regular habit of reading is one of the most important ways in which this crucial aspect of their education can be strengthened. Sparx reader provides that regular programme, at a level tailored to each student, in a way that is measurable, consistent, and effective.

Students will visit https://sparxreader.com/

To log in:

• Type in their school name and selecting 'Henley Bank':



• And logging in using their school google account



Your child will have received a full explanation of how to operate Sparx reader in lessons but, in essence, they are given a book:



They read the book online, through the Sparx website, and answer questions about what they've read.



For each correct answer, they score **Sparx Reader Points (SRPs)**. They get more points for answering questions correctly the first time, so careful reading is encouraged before they attempt the questions.

The homework each week is simple: Get 300 SRPs

(On average, it takes students 1 minute of careful reading to acquire 10 SRPs, so 300 SRPs = around 30 minutes of reading plus 30 minutes of questions, so 1 hour of homework).

This is logged from Tuesday morning (8am) to Tuesday morning (7am) - the week's SRPs must be acquired between these times to be considered valid.
